

North Carolina Medicare Advantage Beneficiaries Receive Better Value and Spend 39% Less than Beneficiaries in Medicare FFS

41% (835,821) of Medicare beneficiaries in North Carolina were enrolled in Medicare Advantage (MA) in 2020.

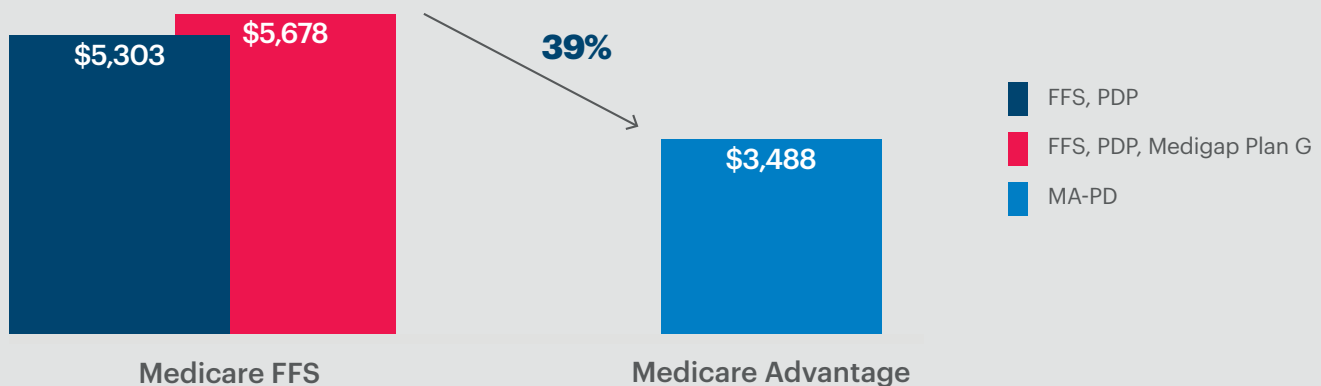
The average Medicare Advantage and Prescription Drug (MA-PD) plan beneficiary in North Carolina spends:



\$1,815 Less than a beneficiary in North Carolina who enrolls in traditional **Medicare Fee-For-Service (FFS) and a prescription drug plan (PDP)**

\$2,191 Less than a beneficiary in North Carolina who also purchases **Medigap Plan G as supplemental coverage for medical out-of-pocket costs**

Within All Age Groups, North Carolina's Beneficiaries in MA-PD Spend Less than those in Medicare FFS

than an **85-year old** FFS
beneficiary in average health

In addition to the dental, vision, and hearing benefits typically offered, **the average MA-PD beneficiary in North Carolina receives \$159 in annual supplemental benefits**, such as care coordination, meals and non-emergency transportation, not offered by Medicare FFS.
