United Health Foundation and Community of Hope: Improving Chronic Disease Outcomes in Washington, D.C.

Community of Hope (COH) is a Federally Qualified Health Center in Washington, D.C., providing health care services to almost 16,000 community members annually. COH also works to end homelessness through housing supports for families and individuals.

In 2024 the United Health Foundation, the philanthropic foundation of UnitedHealth Group, announced a three-year, \$3 million grant partnership with Community of Hope to help address high rates of chronic conditions among underserved individuals in Wards 7 and 8. Specifically, the grant enables COH to expand its community health worker program, increase care coordination and provide additional support for care transitions, ultimately reaching more patients through their chronic disease care management program.
